Why care about rocky habitats?

- Oregon's iconic rocky habitats from Haystack Rock to Cape Blanco are biologically, culturally and economically important
- They support a wealth of marine life including nesting seabirds, marine mammals, kelp beds, and many fish and invertebrate species
- They put food on the table by supporting fisheries, sustainable seafood, and coastal economies
- They attract millions of visitors enjoying recreational activities from tidepooling to fishing helping support a 2+ billion dollar tourism industry



Threats to Rocky Habitats

- Climate impacts from increasing marine heat waves & changing ocean currents are stressing rocky habitats
- Rocky habitats are increasingly vulnerable to disturbance from people as visitation to these areas increases
- Despite a new Rocky Habitat Management plan, agency and community capacity is limited to ensure the plan gets implemented successfully



New Rocky Habitat Sites

In 2023, Oregon designated **eight new rocky habitat sites** along the Oregon Coast based on a recommendation from the Ocean Policy Advisory Council. This was done through the updated Rocky Habitat Management Strategy. **These new designations strengthen the protection of key habitats and marine life while guiding responsible recreational use.**

Newly designated sites: Ecola Point, Chapman Point, Cape Lookout, Cape Foulweather, Fogarty Creek, Coquille Point, Blacklock Point and Cape Blanco.



What we are doing to help rocky habitats

- Oregon Ocean Alliance is working to ensure relevant state agencies have adequate budgets to manage and regulate activities at rocky habitat sites
- We are working to support increased opportunites for community groups to conduct outreach and stewardship activities so visitors can enjoy our rocky habitats in balance with protection
